The Values of the Week are TOLERANCE and KINDNESS

This first week back, our focused values will be tolerance

and kindness. They are two of our core school values and we

will be discussing what these can both look and feel like to

each of us, daily.

One of the most important things we can do to raise a tolerant child is talk about what tolerance is, and model it ourselves. 'Tolerance is most needed when we don't agree with someone, or when they are different from us. It's about learning to discuss things and argue with people without getting angry or upset.' Explains Rhian Seller, co-founder of the Learn2Think Foundation, which organises the UN International Day for Tolerance in primary schools.

We will begin the week as usual with our Values Circle Time and as a school we will be discussing what we think we should tolerate and whether there are things we *never* have to tolerate.

Remember we love to hear about how the children are showing and sharing our school values at home! Listen out for examples where your child is showing tolerance; or have been able to discuss and challenge a situation at home where perhaps someone hasn't been very tolerant!


Simply message the class teacher via Class Dojo for a home nomination which will be read out and celebrated at Daily Meeting.
